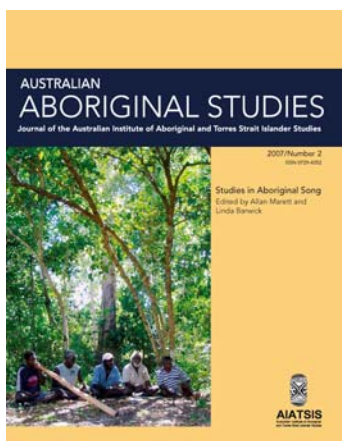

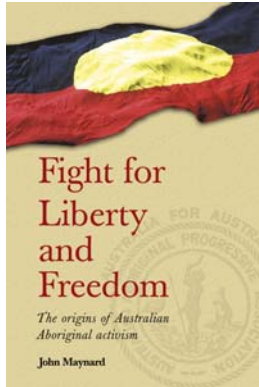
KEYS TO SUCCESS FOR INDIGENOUS ORGANISATIONS

ASP AUTHOR HITS THE AIRWAVES



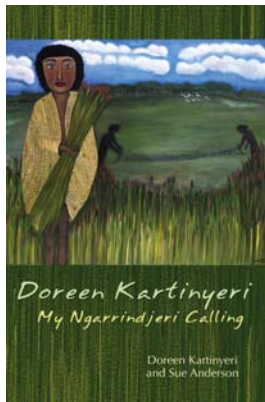

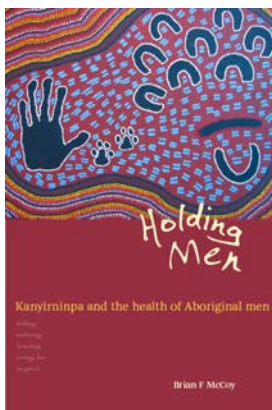

Holding Men: Kanyirninpa and the health of Aboriginal men **Brian McCoy**

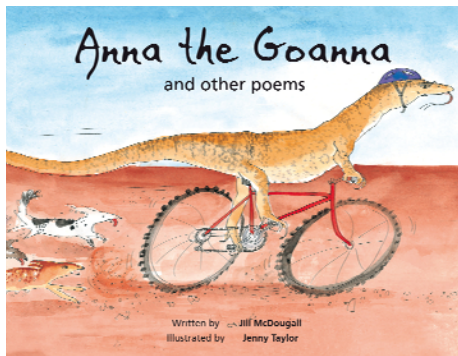

CHILDREN'S PUBLICATIONS

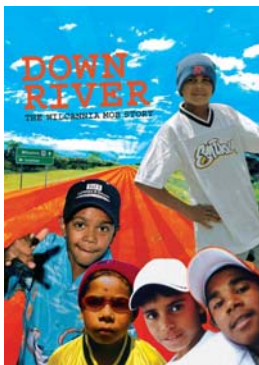

Also designed for younger readers is *Down River*, a large-format, illustrated version of the journey taken by the five young boys, the Wilcannia Mob. These boys recorded their own rap lines to a simple didgeridoo beat in 2002 and became an overnight hit when the song hit high rotation. Till then they'd been just a bunch of passionate kids having fun at a holiday workshop. They went on to win a Deadly Award and perform at the Homebake Festival.
